A Matter of (Mis)Trust

Mainstream systems would not allow Anishinabek to care for their families; they did not trust that Anishinabek had legitimate processes and systems.

Anishinabek Ways Are Better

Leaders and families have made this statement for as long as the child welfare system has been imposed on the Anishinabek.

Not Our Way

Anishinabek did not write down our methods.
Anishinabek methods were taught through stories, ceremonies and teachings. Values and principles were entrenched in Anishinabek every day living.

Understanding and Relationship

To build trust, Indigenous peoples have started to document customs and practices to accommodate mainstream understanding.

ADR Under the former CFSA & Policy Directive CW 005-06 – Limited to one of the following:

- Child Protection Mediation Agency workers and the family work with a qualified mediator
- Family Group Conferencing Family, child (where approp.), extended family and community, agency workers, service providers develop plan to address the concerns via <u>qualified</u> coordinator assisting.
- Aboriginal Approaches Traditional methods established by FNs via Facilitators skilled in FN traditional methods (This is where the Anishinabek Nation process fits in)
- Other approach as approved by Exec. Director & meeting the requirements of the policy

- ADR under new CYFSA No Policy Directive yet, but in development
- AN CWBWG We need an Anishinabek process to meet the needs of our Anishinabek children, families and communities!
- Provincial Indigenous Dispute Resolution
 Curriculum (Ontario; Six Nations Justice Dept.)
- Anishinabek Nation designed process needed!



Overview of the Project

- DR specifically for child well-being matters
- Anishinaabe developed culture & customs
- Support our 40 First Nations in child wellbeing
- AN Child Well-Being Law (CWBL) & Ontario CYFSA processes
- Available at any time (prevention or protection)
- Promoting access to justice for Anishinabek children, families & communities

- This is for the child(ren)!
- Circle process important
- Facilitator & Elder & initial steps are key!
- Facilitators trained as per Anishinabek qualifications & standards
- Flexibility & adaptability to meet diversity (ex. culture, religion, difficult situations)
- Child-minding, Mental Health & Location
